

Guidelines for authors

The journal publishes research and professional articles from all fields of economics that primarily focus on analyses of the Croatian economy and comparisons with other countries. Contributions relating to economic topics relevant for EU and SEE countries with implications for the Croatian economy are also welcome. The journal also contains a section on book reviews, conference summaries or reports on similar events. The published articles are listed in the AEA (American Economic Association) indexes included in JEL on CD, e-JEL, and EconLit as well as ABI/INFORM, EBSCO, International Bibliography of the Social Sciences (IBSS), SCOPUS and Hrčak – Portal of scientific journals of Croatia.

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Submitted articles undergo a double-blind review process. Authors are informed about the final status of their papers within three months from the date of submission. Submitted articles should contain original unpublished work that has not been submitted for publication elsewhere.

Submitted articles should be in Croatian or English, double spaced, approximately 20-30 pages long, accompanied by abstract, keywords (2-5) and JEL classification. The abstract should not exceed 200 words. The abstract, keywords and JEL classification should be in both languages. The first page of the article should contain the article title and the names and affiliations of all authors, as well as their job positions (scientific/teaching positions, if applicable), addresses and e-mail addresses. The first page should be submitted in both languages. Equations, figures and tables should be numbered consecutively with Arabic numerals. Tables and figures should be fully titled. Footnotes to tables and figures (sources and notes) should be placed at the bottom of the table and figure.

Reviews will be taken into consideration only for books which have been published within the last two years. The first page of the book review should contain the name(s) of the book's author(s), the publisher, the place and year of publication, and number of pages. The first page should also contain the name and affiliation, job position (scientific/teaching position, if applicable), address and e-mail address of the author of the review.

In the submitted research/professional articles and reviews, in-text references should be used as follows:

- the reference should be in brackets, containing the author's surname and year of publication, e.g. (Brown, 1986; Jones, 1978),
- the page number should be included for quotations, e.g. (Brown, 1986: 63),
- if the reference was written by two or three authors, all should be mentioned, e.g. (Smith and Johnson, 1983),
- for more than three authors, use the first author followed by et al., e.g. (Jones et al., 1978),
- if several works by the same author were published in the same year, they should be differentiated by letters (a, b, c, etc.) following the year of publication, e.g. (Jones, 1978a; 1978b),
- legal sources should contain the name and number of the publication, including the date if available, e.g. (Official Journal, L 014, 20/01/1998).

The reference list at the end of the article should be provided in alphabetical order and should contain complete information on the papers and data sources mentioned in the text, in the following style:
