From Sustainability to Economic Success: Does Economic Success Enable Sustainability?

Summary

This study empirically investigates the causal relationship between economic strength, measured by GDP per capita, and sustainability performance, operationalized through the Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) Index, across European Union member states from 2000 to 2023. Utilizing a two-stage methodology incorporating cluster analysis and the Dumitrescu-Hurlin panel Granger causality test optimized by the Akaike Information Criterion (AIC), countries were initially classified into two distinct groups: Upperperformers with higher economic and sustainability outcomes, and Underperformers with lower performance levels. Each group representing panel data was subjected to Granger-causality testing. Results robustly confirm that economic strength does Granger-cause sustainability achievements, particularly in the Upperperformers cluster, while evidence of reverse causality is limited to select cases. These findings support a theoretical shift viewing sustainability not merely as a compliance cost, but as an endogenous driver of long-term economic resilience. The study underscores the critical role of public investment and knowledge sharing in fostering microlevel adaptive sustainability practices, which in turn mitigate macroeconomic risks.
